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GBRA Hosts Grand Opening at New Sattler Office

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SEGUIN - The Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority is hosted a "grand opening" for invited guests on Wednesday, Aug. 6 at its new Sattler office, located at 2075 FM 2673 Copper Canyon Plaza. GBRA began operations of the Sattler office in June and held an open house in July.

"One of GBRA's priorities is being responsive to the needs of its constituents. Opening this new office directly addresses a need to have an on-site presence of GBRA in the Sattler and Canyon Lake communities," Bill West, general manager said. "These communities have been very receptive to GBRA's responsiveness in providing that presence, as well as effective stewardship of the gorge."

Jaynellen Ladd, newly hired GBRA natural resource specialist, is the GBRA representative at the Sattler office. "The office will serve as an information center for residents of the Canyon Lake area, as well as visitors to the reservoir and river," Tommie Streeter Rhoad, GBRA's economic development manager, said. "In addition to serving as a liaison between the Canyon Lake community and GBRA, Jaynellen also manages the development and day-to-day activities of the Canyon Lake Gorge."

"The goal is to give visitors an understanding of the Canyon Reservoir Project, and the Canyon Lake Gorge through the partnership efforts between the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Gorge Preservation Society," said Ladd.

The Sattler office also will serve as the Canyon Gorge Preservation Society (GPS) headquarters for visitors requesting information or tours of Canyon Gorge. More information about the gorge and GPS can be found online at www.canyongorge.org.

The GBRA was established by the Texas Legislature in 1933 as a water conservation and reclamation district. GBRA provides stewardship for the water resources in its 10-county statutory district, which begins near the headwaters of the Guadalupe and Blanco Rivers, ends at San Antonio Bay, and includes Kendall, Comal, Hays, Caldwell, Guadalupe, Gonzales, DeWitt, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio counties.
