## Canyon Reservoir Drought Restrictions Lifted

SEGUIN -Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority officials have lifted water restrictions on customers of Canyon Reservoir. Canyon Reservoir users had been placed on "voluntary" Stage I restrictions when the reservoir elevation fell below 895 mean sea level (msl).

In early September, Canyon' elevation had fallen as low as 892.7 msl. The reservoir is full at conservation level 909 msl. On Tuesday, Canyon's elevation had risen back up to 899 msl.

In December, the criteria for lifting Canyon Reservoir's restrictions had been met. A copy of the GBRA's water conservation and drought contingency plans are available to view on GBRA's website at <http://www.gbra.org/Conservation/Default.aspx>.

Although the restrictions have been lifted until further notice, GBRA officials urge constituents to continue water conservation efforts. "While there has been some rainfall in the Guadalupe River Basin over the past several weeks, it has not been enough to complete reverse the effects of the drought that has gripped the area for the previous 22 to 23 months," GBRA General Manager Bill West said. "We must continue to be vigilant in conserving our water resources."

The GBRA was established by the Texas Legislature in 1933 as a water conservation and reclamation district. GBRA provides stewardship for the water resources in its 10-county statutory district, which begins near the headwaters of the Guadalupe and Blanco rivers, ends at San Antonio Bay, and includes Kendall, Comal, Hays, Caldwell, Guadalupe, Gonzales, DeWitt, Victoria, Calhoun and Refugio counties. The Mission of the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority is to protect, conserve, reclaim and steward the resources of the 10-county district in order to ensure and promote quality of life for those served.
