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GBRA Rescinds Drought Measures for Cordillera Ranch and Comal Trace

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Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority (GBRA) officials have rescinded drought measures for residents who live in the Cordillera Ranch and Comal Trace subdivisions.

Stage II drought measures were previously in effect as a result of the 30-day average level in the Fair Oaks Utilities test well falling below the 1,045-ft mean sea level trigger. Stage II drought restrictions are being rescinded as a result of this condition ceasing to exist. Stage I will be in effect annually, May 1 through Sept. 30.
